INTRODUCTION

In this exercise we will investigate some of the frequency response characteristics of circuits containing resistive, inductive and/or capacitive elements by performing a phasor analysis of those circuits at a variety of frequency values.

Notes

- This exercise is to be completed on an **individual basis**. No collaboration is allowed between students during the completion of this exercise. If questions arise, contact your instructor for help.
- Utilize **Excel** to perform the calculations and to create the plots required for this experiment.
- Maintain at least three (3) significant digits of accuracy in all of your calculations.

Reminder – When performing a phasor analysis of the circuits defined for this experiment, be sure to express all voltages and currents in terms of their (RMS) phasor equivalents and all resistive, inductive, and capacitive load values as impedances.

PROCEDURE

Investigation #1 – Frequency Response of R-L, R-C, and R-L-C Circuits

Note – Use the following component values for all the circuits utilized during this experiment: (I.e. – for the circuits shown in Figures 8.1, 8.2, and 8.3)

$$v(t) = \sqrt{2} \cdot 24 \cdot \sin(\omega t + 0^\circ)$$
 volts, $R = 62\Omega$, $L = 5mH$, $C = 0.42\mu F$

Series R-L Circuit Response

1. Given the circuit in shown in Figure 8.1, utilize Excel to perform a phasor analysis of the circuit as the frequency (f) varies from $0Hz \rightarrow 20000Hz$ in 250Hz steps.

At each frequency, determine the (RMS) <u>magnitudes</u> of the current \tilde{I}_1 , the inductor voltage \tilde{V}_{L1} , the resistor voltage \tilde{V}_{R1} , and the real power P_{R1} supplied to the resistor.



Figure 8.1 – AC Response of an R-L Circuit

- Hints although Excel is able to perform complex number calculations, you are only being asked to determine the **magnitudes** of the voltages and current. Thus, it may be easier to complete this experiment by defining a set of circuit equations based only on magnitudes.
 - to avoid a "divide-by-zero" error in Excel, approximate the solution for the voltages and currents at 0Hz by utilizing a very tiny frequency, such as 0.001Hz, instead of 0Hz in your spreadsheet.

2. Compile ("tabulate") the results of your analysis into a table that has the following format:

such that it displays the *current and voltage magnitudes* along with the *resistor powers* at each frequency step.

Be sure that the table is titled appropriately (**Table 8.1** – AC Analysis of an R-L Circuit) and that the appropriate units are displayed in the column headings of your table. The same should hold true for the tables required for the remaining steps of this experiment.

3. On one graph, **plot** the *magnitude* of the **current** *as a function of frequency*. (I.e. – the vertical axis is current and the horizontal axis is frequency)

Be sure that all of your plots have accurate titles, that their axes are all labeled, and that the appropriate units are shown.

- On a separate graph, plot both the *magnitude* of the resistor voltage and the *magnitude* of the inductor voltage *as a function of frequency*.
 (Note both voltages must be plotted on the <u>same graph.</u>)
- 5. On a third graph, plot the resistor power as a function of frequency.
- 6. Provide an analysis of your results as represented by the data shown on your plots.

Include a discussion on the "real world" or practical aspects of this circuit.

Note - It may be useful to think in terms of the resistor being the "load" to which the voltage source is supplying real power, and the inductor as a "device" placed in between the "source" and the "load" that affects how much of the "source" waveform that the "load" resistor actually receives.

Series R-C Circuit Response

7. Given the circuit in shown in Figure 8.2, utilize Excel to perform a phasor analysis of the circuit as the frequency (f) varies from $0Hz \rightarrow 20000Hz$ in 250Hz steps.

At each frequency, determine the (RMS) <u>magnitudes</u> of the current \tilde{I}_2 , the capacitor voltage \tilde{V}_{R2} , the resistor voltage \tilde{V}_{R2} , and the real power P_{R2} supplied to the resistor.

- 8. Tabulate the results in a new table that displays the *current and voltage magnitudes* along with the *resistor powers* at each frequency step.
- 9. On one graph, plot the *magnitude* of the current *as a function of frequency*.
- 10. On a separate graph, plot both the *magnitude* of the resistor voltage and the *magnitude* of the capacitor voltage *as a function of frequency*.
- 11. On a third graph, plot the resistor power as a function of frequency.
- 12. Provide an analysis of your results, as represented by the data shown on your plots.

Include a discussion on the "real world" or practical aspects of this circuit.

Series R-L-C Circuit Response

- 13. Given the circuit in shown in Figure 8.3, utilize Excel to perform a phasor analysis of the circuit as the frequency (f) varies from $0Hz \rightarrow 20000Hz$ in 250Hz steps.
 - At each frequency, determine the (RMS) <u>magnitudes</u> of the current \tilde{I}_3 , the resistor voltage \tilde{V}_{R3} , the inductor voltage \tilde{V}_{L3} , the capacitor voltage \tilde{V}_{C3} , and the real power P_{R3} supplied to the resistor.

- 14. Tabulate the results in a new table that displays the *current and voltage magnitudes* along with the *resistor powers* at each frequency step.
- 15. On one graph, plot the *magnitude* of the current as a function of frequency.
- **16.** On a separate graph, plot the *magnitudes* of the **resistor**, **inductor** and **capacitor voltages** *as a function of frequency*.
- 17. On a third graph, plot the resistor power as a function of frequency.
- 18. Provide an **analysis** of your results, as represented by the data shown on your plots.

Include a discussion on the "real world" or practical aspects of this circuit.
